LITHIUM BATTERIES

Why are lithium-ion batteries flammable?

Lithium-ion batteries store a lot of energy in a small amount of space. When that energy is released in an uncontrolled manner, it generates heat, which can turn certain internal battery components into flammable and toxic gases.

How do fires from lithium-ion batteries start?

Lithium-ion battery fires happen for a variety of reasons, such as physical damage (e.g., the battery is penetrated or crushed or exposed to water), electrical damage (e.g., overcharging or using charging equipment not designed for the battery), exposure to extreme temperatures, and product defects.

What are some unique dangers of lithiumion battery fires?

Heat, smoke, the release of toxic gases, and the potential for explosions are the dangers associated with lithium-ion battery fires.

BATTERY DISPOSAL

Do Not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash. Recycling is always the best option. Take them to a battery recycling location or contact your community for disposal instructions, Do NOT put discarded batteries in piles.

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

Having fire extinguishers - and knowing how to use then is an important part of maintaining a safe home for you and your family this summer. When seconds count, having a fire extinguisher nearby is crucial for fire safety and rapid response.





FIRE IS FAST!

- Todays home fires burn hotter and faster than 40 years ago
- Synthetic materials, lightweight construction materials, and open floor plans
- Smoke kills more people than fire
- As little as 2 minutes to safely escape from the time the smoke alarm sounds

PLAN AND PRACTICE YOUR ESCAPE FROM FIRE

- If possible, have 2 ways out of every room in your home and 2 ways out of your home.
- Make sure windows and doors open easily.
- If the alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside.

IF YOU ARE AGE 65 OR OLDER

Older adults are twice as likely as the population at large to be killed or injured by a fire. By age 75, that risk increases to 3-times that of the general population - and 4 times by age 85!
